### Walking for the Past and the Present

The Canadian Cancer Society and Women in Insurance Cancer Crusade (WICC) **Toronto Relay For Life** will feature a series of special presentations, including a heart-felt eulogy for six-time Relay For Life participant Susan Walsh, who lost her battle with cancer on **April 20, 2018**. The inspiring event will take place at **Downsview Park on June 15**, from 6 p.m. to midnight.

"Susan Walsh was an inspiration. Individually, she raised over \$26,500 for the Canadian Cancer Society, and her team, Team Susan, raised over \$46,000. She believed that research is the key, which is why WICC and the insurance industry are lacing up for the 10th year in a row to support this life-changing cause," said Marilyn Horrick, Co-Chair, WICC Ontario.

In 2012, Walsh decided to enroll as a Relay For Life participant with her company team and was diagnosed with triple-negative breast cancer just two days before the event.

"Thus truly began my advocacy for cancer patients and cancer research," said Walsh in 2017 when asked why she Relays. "I walk because no matter what type of cancer you may have or where you are being treated, you may benefit from the Relay because [all] money raised helps fund research across Canada."

Cancer survivor Bobbie Goldie of Chubb Insurance (U.S.) will be flying in all the way from Georgia, U.S.A., for the Relay to present the tribute for long-time...

**Grant Funding Update** 

### WICC Selects 2018/19 Grant

Every few years the WICC Ontario Chapter allocates funds to specific grants to fund cancer research projects.

This year a portion of WICC dollars are going to support a **3-year**, **\$74,500** Innovation Impact Grant with Dr. Patrick Gunning of

the University of Toronto.

The study investigates the UBA5 enzyme in cancer proliferation and as a promising

target for secondary therapy. The emergence of drug resistance during cancer treatment is a significant concern and a substantial clinical challenge.

With the support of an Innovation Grant, Dr. Patrick Gunning developed a small molecule that could block UBA5 by binding to a unique area on the protein. Dr. Gunning will now refine the design of this inhibitor to make it more potent and targeted. He will then study its ability to slow breast tumour progression in mice and whether it can sensitize breast cancer cells to chemotherapeutics. This could allow lower doses of chemotherapeutics to be used, which could prevent or delay drug resistance.

# CCS Applauds Federal Plans to Require Health Warning on Cigarette Itself by Canadian Cancer Society

31 May 2018 - OTTAWA The Canadian Cancer Society is applauding the announcement today by Minister of Health Ginette Petitpas Taylor of plans to require a health warning directly on the cigarette itself. "A health warning on the cigarette itself would be a cost-effective communications opportunity to convey a health message given that there are 27 billion cigarettes sold each year in Canada," says Rob Cunningham, Senior Policy Analyst, Canadian Cancer Society. "A warning on the cigarette will continue to work when away from the package, such as when a teenager asks a friend for a cigarette."

"A health warning on the cigarette itself would also make cigarettes less attractive and provide an additional measure to reduce contraband. By requiring a marking on cigarettes intended for legitimate sale in Canada, law enforcement authorities would have a further tool to respond to illegal cigarettes."

An amendment for regulatory authority to require a health warning on the cigarette itself was approved with allparty support by the House of Commons Standing Committee on Health during consideration of Bill S-5.

Minister Petitpas Taylor also announced her support to require the slide and shell format for pending plain and standardized packaging regulations. This format was recommended by health organizations to enhance the effectiveness of the regulations.

"We strongly support the requirement for slide and shell packaging format," adds Cunningham. "Among the benefits, this format will increase the size and thus the effectiveness of health warnings."

The announcements by the Minister of Health were made as part of the launch of Canada's Tobacco Strategy, the new strengthened federal tobacco control strategy.

Tobacco use is the leading preventable cause of disease and death in Canada, killing more than 45,000 Canadians annually. Tobacco is responsible for \$6.5 billion in annual health care costs.
